A HOLD is something that will prevent you from registering.


It is your responsibility to make sure all holds are taken care of prior to registration. You can view your holds on MyBenU under the BU Notifications tile.




- Advisor Approval Required: By completing this event, you

- NCAA: Not a hold





The General Education Curriculum also requires all undergraduates to complete a Liberal Arts-based system of curricular and co-curricular electives in areas representing multiple disciplinary approaches and modes of problem-solving. These distribution requirements are courses designated by programs and departments as representing critical skill and knowledge areas for active and responsible citizenship and stewardship of the earth, lifelong learning, global awareness, integrative knowledge, and effective interpersonal communication. The distribution requirements of the curriculum include coursework in the arts and humanities, sciences and social sciences. To enhance effective and broad-based learning, the General Education Curriculum also requires students to complete designated global and sustainability courses or activities, as well as at least one Learning Community or Engaged Learning co-curricular experience.

A list of classes that fulfill these requirements are found in the 2024-2025 catalog.

*Please note: Sometimes one class can satisfy one or two co-curriculars.


Electives

- You need 120 credit hours to earn your degree

Major Requirements


- Course Requirements and credits vary by major

- Check the Catalog for specific course and credit requirements for your major




Searching for General Education Requirements

When looking for courses that satisfy your General Education Requirements, you can search for each category to find a full list of courses that fulfill each requirement.


1. From the home screen in MyBenU, choose "Manage Classes"




2. Next, choose "Class Search and Enroll":



- 3. -Choose the term that applies (in this case Fall 2025)
 - -Enter the Q Code category (QHT, QCA, QIO etc.) you are looking for into the "Search For Classes" field. For the list of Q-Codes, see the General Education section above.



4. A list of courses will then be generated that fulfill the General Education Requirement selected, so you can browse and choose a course that is the right fit for your schedule. In this example, we entered QHT in the search for classes area:

CLASS SECTIONS

When you are registering for classes, it is very important to pay attention to the section of the course you are selecting. When you register on MyBenU, you will find the section in the "Class" column:



Now that you know where to find the section, please take note of the following information so you do not select a section you are ineligible for:

Lisle Campus:

A, B, C, D, etc.: These are used to designate Lisle campus in person sections. **Mesa campus students are not eligible for sections that are regular letters.**

OLA, OLB, OLC, OLD, etc.: These are also Lisle campus courses that are online. **Mesa campus students are not eligible** for these sections.

Mesa Campus:

M1, M2, M3, M4, etc.: These are used to designate courses on the Mesa, Arizona campus. MC stands for "Mesa Campus," and the number is used when there are multiple sections of one course. Lisle campus students are not eligible for these sections.

MOL1, MOL2, MOL3, MOL4, etc.: These are used to designate online courses for the Mesa, Arizona campus. M stands for "Mesa" and the number is used when there are multiple sections of one course. Lisle campus students are not eligible for these sections.

Cross-Campus:

XC1, XC2, XC3, etc.: Section XC stands for "cross-campus" and means **students from both the Lisle, IL, and Mesa, AZ, campuses are eligible** for the class. Typically, XC classes are virtual with no designated meeting time (Online Asynchronous), but there are exceptions.

AP and Dual Credit

These are outside credits that were awarded or can be accepted and applied to graduation requirements.

Dual credit that was earned through another institution will be applied to your degree audit once official transcripts from the institution in which the credit was awarded are received.

AP credit is awarded once a student accepts and returns the PFEC. Students can accept up to 30 credit hours. If you are wondering what course or requirement your AP credit fulfills, please speak with your advisor.
